# Immerse yourself in a living cultural landscape

In the dreaming, ancestral beings created the physical and cultural landscapes and inscribed on them religious and customary laws that endure today. Reflect on this as you walk among the gravity-defying boulders at *Karlu Karlu* **/ Devils Marbles**; see the giant rock spire tower above the desert plains at **Chambers Pillar**, watch the setting sun light the colours of Rainbow Valley, or wander about the petroglyphs at N'Dhala Gorge and Napwerte / Ewaninga.



## Explore on foot

Slow down while strolling along short interpretive walks and gain an insight into the country surrounding you. Escape from civilisation for a while: hike the Ormiston Pound Loop (8.5 km), the Giles Track in Watarrka (22 km overnight), or the Larapinta Trail through Tjoritja / West MacDonnell National Park (over



# Re-live the experiences of the early settlers

Explore the homestead of one of the first cattle stations in central Australia along the Owen Springs 4WD track. Visit Arltunga, the first established central Australian town, and relive the thrill of the gold rush. Learn about the first crosscontinental communication system at the **telegraph stations** of Alice Springs, Barrow Creek and Tennant Creek.

# Enjoy a refreshing swim

In Tjoritja / West MacDonnell National Park you can swim at Ellery Creek Big Hole or Ormiston Gorge. Look out for some of the nine species of fish that can survive in these desert extremes. Bring a snorkel to get even more out of your swim! Be aware that the water can get extremely cold at all times of the year.

# Camp in a scenic park

Experience the brilliance of the outback night sky, fall asleep to the sounds of the bush and wake with the dawn chorus. Choose from our 23 campgrounds, ranging from remote bush sites to powered camping areas with showers and free gas barbecues.



# Bike through the bush

Pedal through 17 km of secluded bushland. Ride the sealed path starting opposite Flynn's Grave, west of Alice Springs, and finish at **Simpsons Gap**. The gentle terrain is suitable for the whole family. For a more technical ride, head to *Alice Springs* **Telegraph Station**. Ride the Centre's best mountain bike trails that give you plenty of opportunity to test your skills and create



## Drive in to an adventure

Take a 4WD track away from the crowds. For a short trip, travel to **Palm Valley** to see relicts of a wetter time. For a challenge, drive along the Finke River to **Boggy Hole** and through to **Illamurta Springs**. For a truly remote experience, explore the tracks of *lytwelepenty* / Davenport Ranges. Remember to travel well equipped and check road conditions



## Stroll through a living field quide

The **Alice Springs Desert Park** truly is a living field guide, with 2 km of gentle paths winding through fully-described desert habitats, eight large aviaries, aquaria, and a nocturnal house. Visit for a few hours or stay the whole day, it is the ideal introduction to the nature and cultures of central Australia. Alice Springs Desert Park is open daily from 7.30 am to 6.00 pm. Entry fees apply.
